At the time of writing the weather is feeling particularly 'festive'. This term has been a long one, spanning the end of summer and Harvest time, through to the snows of winter. The children


have continued to work hard and a considerable amount of learning had happened, before, during and after our 'outstanding' OFSTED. Here are just a few examples of our learning in Lower School.


Back in October we held our Harvest Festival. Parents and pupils who attended enjoyed

Several of the KS2 classes have been studying the Ancient Egyptians this term. The learning has in-










volved lots of hands on activities such as making Shadufs,

Upper School Autumn Term 2017

Student Leaders—We have been busy this term, setting up a new Student Leadership Group. This group consists of nine senior students and five peer mentors. We have appointed senior students based on their maturity, aptitude and application. They have received training which includes leadership skills and presentation skills. We have established five focus groups: Learning Culture,

Sport and Community, Health and Well-being, Student Council and ECO school. Each focus group is led by a small group of the senior students.



The Student Council has been established with representatives from different form groups who meet half termly with the senior students. A senior student oversees the student council with the support of a member of staff.

Five year 8 students have been selected and trained as peer mentors. This is an ongoing programme which runs throughout the year.

This term the peer mentors have been given the opportunity to use their skills working with younger students in school.



We were so lucky to have people from the deaf community give up their time to talk to our students about the different jobs they do. Senior students led house assemblies on how we could use student feedback to improve our school learning culture.










Shakespeare School Festival


Despite the nerves, we delivered a fantastic performance. Now, our exhausted actors and actresses are insisting on more plays!





Heath House Autumn Term:2017

Autumn term 2017: This autumn has been an extremely busy one for the children and young people. There has been a wide variety of Heath House activities, clubs and outings taking place. In addition to all this happening around Heath House there have also been a number of projects taking place. We have had a Hedgehog project and a gardening project. Some of the younger pupils have also been attending a number of after school clubs such as sports club and football club.






Gardening: The young people in Heath House helped to plant up the Viking ship with bulbs and plants ready for the spring time.

Snorkelling: This term some of the children and young people have been attending a snorkelling course at Westminster Lodge. This is what they had to say:

"I am really enjoyed because when I wear my snorkel and goggles I could see everything in swimming pool."

"I really excited to learn snorkelling."

Free walking and money management: Staff have been working closely with the young people to develop their free walking skills. We have also been teaching the young people about purchasing their cookery ingredients independently. They have to use their recipes to work out what to buy and how much items cost they then pay for the items by themselves.



"I am enjoy play tennis in school because I learn about skills."



Cubs: This term the children have continued to work towards more badges at Cubs. They managed to work towards and achieve the communicator activity badge, sports endurance badge, personal challenge badge, our world challenge award badge, pioneering badge and many more badges.

Verity: We started a new project in the Autumn called Heath House Hedgehog Huts. The children and young people successfully completed 3 shelters which they named 'Pikachu', 'Rose' and 'Bart'. They wrote a weekly log to say what they felt they had learnt or accomplished. After collecting research and learning about hibernation the young people began to make the shelters using different materials. The young people were very excited when we were lucky enough to see two hedgehogs one evening. When the shelters were completed the children gathered hay and food and put them outside ready for any hedgehogs wishing to find a home. This was a fun and exciting project that we hope to revisit next Autumn!





Flowerbed project: This term the children and young people planned to learn how to grow their own vegetables. Firstly they had to prepare the area where the flower bed was to go, by removing all the weeds and bushes. After this Thomas's brother came to build a flower bed for the young people.



After this the young people had to weather proof the flower bed. As a team they painted the flower bed.

"I had help flower bed and paint with my friends I help move soil as well".

"We painted the wood to help protect it from the weather."





Next the young people had to measure up the flower bed so it could be lined with plastic sheeting. This is to help protect the wood from rotting in the future.

The young people worked with Thomas and Ursula to measure cut and staple the plastic sheeting to the inside of the flowerbed.



For the final step we had to order a ton of soil to put in the flower bed. The secondary boys worked together to move the soil into the flower bed. The young people are now looking forward to planting up the flower bed next year and learning to grow a variety of vegetables and herbs to have with our dinner in the evenings.



Multi purpose games table: As a reward for the continued positive behaviour of the young people in Heath House. Staff purchased a multi-purpose game table. The young people have enjoyed learning how to play pool and play air hockey with there friends in the evening.

"I really like learn play pool."

Harvester meal: The children and young people also choose to go for a meal out. The young people discussed going for a meal during the pupil meeting. They all agreed to go to the Harvester.

"I liked going for meal with friends. I had fun and enjoyed food chicken, salad and chips."

Pumpkin farm: To get ready for Halloween we went to a pumpkin farm so that the children and young people could select their own pumpkins.

Heath House Halloween pumpkin farm: The young people enjoyed having a Halloween party this term. They organised games, food and a party. The children displayed carved pumpkins in the pupil kitchen as well as making decorations and decorating Heath House.



Christmas party: This year the Heath House party was a successful one with lots of lovely food, games and a Christmas jumper competition. Thank you everyone for coming and to those that helped with organising and setting up this party and making it such an enjoyable evening for all involved.

Center Parcs: For our end of term activity we organised to go to Center Parcs. The young people enjoyed going to the pancake house, they also were entertained by fire breathers, fire dancers as well as a firework display. After this they went for a swim at the swimming centre where they enjoyed the flumes.



BSL Centre Autumn Term 2017

Well what a start to this academic year. The number of learners on courses this year is the largest since the BSL Centre opened in 2009. All courses which started in September are full to the brim! We have welcomed back past learners and greeted new learners, all developing their BSL skills within our safe learning environment.

The Signature Awards were held in November in Leeds, both Zayne Thomson and Emma Caswell were nominated for awards again. Zayne was shortlisted for the Emerging Teacher Award and Emma was short listed for the Professional Contribution Award. It was a magical night of networking, meeting excited nominees and a lovely sit down meal with old friends and new. Then the announcement of the awards winners; Zayne was unlucky this year, however Emma won her category. Emma was shocked and delighted to win the award, she has been working hard with Signature on various projects helping to improve BSL qualifications and create new ones.

Well done Emma—we are all thrilled for you!

With two award winning teachers we will have to aim for an award for Centre of the Year next.

The parents group started back after the summer break, we had a few new faces too. They have been working on stories and topical vocabulary linked to topics taught in school.

BSL Level 1 groups have all taken their first assessments, some are awaiting results over this week. They are all enthusiastic and keen to learn.







We saw a rise in the number of learners applying for BSL Level 3 this year. We have 3 groups and each one is full. They have all been learning linguistics and developing their productive skills through research and presentations. They are now learning how to self-analyse and develop their skills further by applying the linguistic knowledge they have been acquiring.

Some leaners have expressed how much harder the course is compared to BSL Level 2, however they are thoroughly enjoying it. BSL Level 3 is a step up from Level 2, you learn more linguistics and are expected to apply this to your productive skills. The only way to develop your BSL skills is be meeting Deaf people and using it, along with attending class!

This takes us to BSL Level 4, two classes again this year, both full and learning that Level 3 was actually easy compared to Level 4. Level 4 brings additional linguistic knowledge building upon the learning at Level 3. It also brings an expectation of taking control of your development as a learner. Level 4 is a foundation degree and the work is meant to be hard, the more effort you put in the greater the rewards.

Learners have completed translation activities from both English to BSL and BSL to English, research into topics such as Jobs and Medicine for filming conversations. They have also been learning how to self-analyse

and mark their conversation work.



What's on in January?

We have BSL Level 1 fast Track courses—Tuesday evening 5pm-8pm or Thursday Morning 10am-1pm. Places are filling up already.

We are looking at providing a BSL Level 6 course starting in February. Interviews to be held in January. Places are limited for this course, if you would like more information please contact the BSL Centre via bsl@heathlands.herts.sch.uk

Sign and Play This continues to be a popular afternoon for our families. This year has had a real family feel, with one new family bringing 7 members! Lovely to see new members in our community




