Upper School - Autumn Term 2016

The autumn term kicked off to a good start with a full day workshop in October led by ex professional footballer Luther Blissett, the workshop was called 'Give Racism the Red Card.' Students spent the day learning about racism in football and how this can affect players but also how racism affects people everyday. Racism was discussed through several different workshops, the students gave speeches, made posters and had some practical coaching from Luther. The day was enjoyed by all and most importantly made all students think about some important issues to be aware of.



Fully grown courgettes were picked from the school's mini-garden, and given to the Food Technology Department so that US3 students could make Courgette Carbonara and they enjoyed tasting it!







US1 have been learning about mapping as part of their Geography studies. They have been learning to use satellite photographs,

Maths Challenge



Students have been taking part in a weekly maths challenge that is displayed on a corridor noticeboard. All students who enter are awarded one house point. Depending on the type of challenge the best answers are awarded four house points or if there can be only one answer, a draw is made from all correct answers submitted. The solution is explained by the winning student in the weekly assembly each Friday.

In English this term, US1 students read Shakespeare's play, "Macbeth". The students were shown scenes from various productions of the play. They were given a character to portray and had to learn their lines and act key scenes. They wrote character descriptions, scene synopses, newspaper reports and letters from the characters

explaining their motives. It was a challenging unit of work for them, but they put in a magnificent effort.



All the students have been working really hard this term. In particular two students were pleased with their progress, one said: "I am proud of myself because I'm improve behaviour. I got non-school uniform certificate as first time, I got 72 points! If you have over 40 points mean you can had non-school uniform for one special day. They made invitation cards for a baptism as part of their coursework and then held their own baptism service. They assumed the roles of various participants, such as the vicar, the parents and godparents. They acted the various events that occur during a service, such as making a promise to look after the new baby, wetting the baby's head, making a sign of the cross on the baby's forehead, signing the certificate and giving participants a candle to help quide the baby in his or her new life.

Upper School Enterprise Day

Just before half term US5,6,7,8 and 9 took part in an Enterprise Day. US5 worked on an independent project making things to sell at the Children in Need stall on Halloween. They made a range of spooky, disgusting things to eat, drink or display.

They came into the hall at the end of the day to show us what they had been making. We were all very impressed.

All the other groups were split up into teams of 5 or 6 people to become competitors in the business challenge. Mark Bolton from NDCS came to talk to all the groups about what makes a business work. The students completed an activity making towers from marshmallows and spaghetti which made us really work as a team and think about costings.

Three volunteers also came to help us throughout the day and share their business knowledge: Simon from NDCS, Lara Steward, owner of Greenfield Pet Shop & Co-Director of PAD Productions Limited and Jeff McWhinney, Chief Executive of Significant (SignVideo) and formerly CEx of the British Deaf Association. We are very grateful to all of them for giving up their time.

In the afternoon the students had to work fast to get ready to pitch our ideas to the dragons (Simon, Lara, Jeff and Mr Hazrati) in order to get the £250 capital to start their business. The dragons had a really hard job deciding which was the best. They finally decided the team who were crowned the winners and had the most original idea, had developed a colourful glove with a black spot to remind people about young people facing mental illness.

Mark, and the other dragons, were really impressed with the attitude and work ethic of all the students involved and some students deserved special mention for their business skills. A great day was had by all. Now we just need to get the business up and running. **Tesneem said:** "I feel confident about business now as I learnt lots about it" **another student said:** "I learnt about designing T-shirts for my team" and **another said:** "I enjoyed making the marshmallow tower"

each of the rooms, the creative ideas were brilliant making it very


hard to judge the winners.
























This term we welcomed Neal who started as a residential worker in November.

BSL Centre - Autumn Term 2016

With Christmas only a few weeks away we have been busy with the first exams for some classes and mock exams for others. Our new learners have settled in well and are enjoying their courses. We have a large number of learners again this year, and additional courses were formed to accommodate numbers.

The parents group has both old and new faces. Its lovely to see our regular parents supporting our new parents, offering advice and a supportive environment to share information. They have been working their way through the BSL level 1 curriculum with additional signs for home use and story telling skills.





All our BSL Level 1 learners have taken their first exams and are now developing their BSL skills and vocabulary working towards their 102 assessment in March/April time.

Our BSL Level 1 young persons group is thriving, it's the biggest group we've had so far. Some are keen to continue onto BSL Level 2!

We have three BSL Level 2 classes, all learners have been practising their receptive skills with weekly homework tasks. They have had to learn a lot of vocabulary to develop their productive skills, but they are doing really well.



BSL Level 3 has been popular this year. We have two groups, both full. They have been learning linguistics of BSL and how to apply this to their productive skills. They have been involved in debates, discussions and created presentations to film. They are now revising for their linguistics exams.





BSL Level 4, new cohort this year have been developing their linguistic knowledge, conversational skills and filming for their portfolios. They have learnt how to self analyse their film clips and recognise the linguistic elements to tick off.





Due to the demand for BSL practice and development of skills, we created two courses this year. The first course is suitable for learners who have BSL level 2/3 and would like to develop these skills. The second course is for learners who have BSL level 3/4 and want to refresh linguistics as well as develop receptive and productive skills. Both course have been going well, learners are enjoying the class and not having the pressure of exams.
