


GCSE Revision Clubs

The trips looked amazing with a real mixture of work, play and cultural experiences over the two weeks. Anyone going on it would benefit in so many ways and also help others who are less fortunate than themselves. A number of the students (and some of the staff) are keen to apply for a place!

Be warned—if any of the students are accepted on a trip, they will be organising fund raising activities both in school and in the deaf community to try and raise the money they need!



US 1 and 3 took part in their STEM Day on 3rd March. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. They had the opportunity to meet and hold animals including a toad, a tarantula, a cockroach, a snake and lastly a fluffy rabbit! Students were very enthusiastic and keen to ask lots of questions about the animals. Some were brave enough to





carry the snake around their necks!

There were various activities throughout the day such as a Bake Off in Food Technology, building strong bridges in D&T and drawing tessellation patterns in Maths. In Science, the

students took on the role of forensic



scientists trying to solve a murder in the Science laboratory



where they applied techniques such as analysing fingerprints and collecting evidence.

Heathlands Girls win third consecutive DCSA Football Championship



The annual Deaf schools' football event took place on the 2nd February in Derby. Twenty-six students from our Upper School department attended the event organised by The Royal School for the Deaf, Derby (RSDD) under the



umbrella of the newly named DCSA (Deaf Children's Sporting Association). Heathlands had five teams competing in the event, three boys teams and two girls. For some pupils it was their first experience of attending the football event. For others it was an opportunity to showcase their footballing talent, engage competitively against other deaf students, and a chance to write themselves into the history books by bringing back the Championship trophy. The boys were unlucky and lost in the semi finals to the eventual winners, Braidwood, but won their final game and finished 3rd overall. The girls put in an fantastic performance of hard work, determination and excellent team working skills winning the Championship which was the third in a row for our girls' team. All the students enjoyed the experience of attending the DCSA event in Derby. Many thanks to the RSDD for organising the event and for Heathlands' staff for supporting on the day and in the preparation for the event.

Paper Recycling Initiative

On 2nd February, four KS4 students were a great help collecting and transporting all the paper to the Frogmore Paper Mill. BSL Centre Newsletter Spring Term 2016



Since Christmas the BSL Centre has been busy with the start of BSL Level 1 fast track course on a Thursday morning. The course is going well and learners have already sat their first assessment. All our courses from September have had learners working hard on developing their BSL skills.

We are now focusing on promoting courses for September 2016. Interviews will be held over the next term for BSL levels 2, 3 and 4. If you know anyone or have family members who have shown an interest in learning BSL then please point them in our direction. We can help them start their learning journey and support them to develop their BSL skills.

Parents group on Monday Mornings has welcomed new parents and carers. It has been lovely to see new faces. We have livened up the parents group by creating two classes, one for beginners and those progressing on the Level 1 course of study and a second class for those who have their BSL level 2 and are continuing to develop their skills and linguistic knowledge.





Level 1 learners are doing really well, they have been working towards their second assessments. One student met a deaf person at work and was able to have a conversation with them, she felt very proud to be able to sign confidently and understand them too.

Our BSL level 1 young persons course is going really well too, they are working towards their second assessment.

We have a large BSL Level 2 class on a Thursday evening, they have been working hard on developing their vocabulary to be able to create presentations to deliver. They have also enjoyed learning some basic linguistics enabling them to understand why signs are created.

Learners are now working towards their assessments next term. They are practising their stories,

Year 11 have sat their BSL Level 2 mocks and will be completing their real assessments after Easter.

BSL Level 3 has been a popular course again this year, we have two courses both full of eager learners. They have completed one assessment and are now focusing on their receptive skills ready for their next assessment in June.

They have enjoyed learning about the History of BSL and researching information for presentations on famous Deaf people, Schools for the Deaf and the Milan conference of 1880.

They have also enjoyed discussion and debates on medical and cultural issues.









We have three BSL level 4 courses running this year. Our Tuesday group have been completing assessments. Whilst our two Thursday groups have been developing their linguistic knowledge even further. BSL level 4 linguistics is quite a jump from the Level 3 and can be tricky for learners to get to grips with. They have worked well and are aiming to take their assessments next term.

Learners have had to learn how to self-analyse by watching their film clips and picking out linguistic elements, this enables them to develop and improve their BSL skills.
