

Dear Parents and Carers

As the year might be finished for the children we are already forging ahead with new plans for the 2015/2016 school year. When students return in September it is very likely that the builders will be back on site! We have been given planning permission for a first floor extension over some of the lower school classrooms. For some time we have had the problem of a leaky flat roof in this part of the school and despite maintenance we have not been able to properly fix it. Building upwards will make us fully water tight and give us more teaching space which can only be good for the children. At this time we expect to use the extension for improved art and design facilities and especially want to include film and photography which is so valuable for deaf children.

Inevitably there will be some disruption in the short term. This will involve some lower school classes being in temporary classrooms for the Autumn Term. These will be set up over the holiday period so that they will be fully operational for September.

Thank you to all the parents who returned their questionnaires or made contribution the review meetings. We really value your feedback and are interested in your suggestions which include teaching foreign languages and teaching BSL on a more formal basis. A number of lower school parents also gave their views on home learning. We will be considering all these views as part of our school self-evaluation and addressing them in the 2015/2016 School Development Plan.

One aspect of the school we are very keen to develop is post 16 education. Some of you may remember this was successfully piloted here in 2012. We have long wanted to extend our upper age range but it is a complex process and we have to get the agreement of our local authority. Any parental views or letters of support for this proposal would be very helpful.

The children have already told me about the many exciting places they are planning to visit over the summer. We hope all our families have a wonderful holidays. Don't forget holiday diaries and to send in a post card for our 40th birthday travel challenge.

We look forward to welcoming the children back to school on Monday 7 September 2015.



Before half term the children had a fantastic opportunity to learn about chickens and chicks when we have some 'living eggs' come to school. The children learnt how to look after them and each class took it in turns to clean them out, feed them, make sure they had enough water and give them some gentle (and very careful) hugs. We also learnt how to get someone's heart working again if they had a heart attack (we have to be gentle and only use two fingers on babies). We also learnt how to remove something that was choking a person".

BSL Courses

We have had three BSL Level 1 courses; Monday evening class saw a large intake of eager learners who have achieved well and have been developing their knowledge of both BSL and Deaf culture. Tuesday morning Level 1 class was a group of hard working ladies, each attending the class for a variety of reasons. Feedback has been great and shows how much fun learning BSL with us really is. Watching each learner growing with confidence at learning the new skill is very rewarding. Thursday evening saw a fast track level 1 course start in February, quite a large group for a fast track course, they have had the pleasure of being taught by Emma and have done very well in keeping up with the speedy learning pace.

This was Zayne's first year of teaching BSL Level 2, "I really appreciate the students showing me lots of patience, it has been a learning curve for me and we all ended up really enjoying the course", one student commented, "Thursday evening is my favourite evening!"

All our level 2 learners have worked hard this year, not only to achieve their exams, but in developing their language and learning about Deaf culture and the community too.







BSL Level 4 started in February, the course will continue into the next academic year. Students have been developing their linguistic knowledge and learning how to self assess their own productive skills.



BSL Level 3 has had a busy year, they have all worked really hard developing their BSL skills and linguistic knowledge. They have finally completed their last assessments and can have a well earned rest.

They have been involved in debates, presentations, discussions and a lot of receptive practice.



As well as our teaching of courses we have delivered Deaf Awareness and basic BSL workshops to the wider community.
