





Thinking Maps




Our teachers here at Heathlands like to try out innovative educational approaches to support language development and learning. The science department has been piloting the use of Thinking Maps; these are visual teaching tools, such as Circle, Bubble, Double Bubble, Flow, Multi-Flow, Brace, Bridge and Tree maps. The maps create a common visual language to help students organise information and learn content in all science disciplines. The use of the Thinking Maps has really helped students with developing a range of thinking processes, including literacy skills. Here are some examples of the work produced.

Multi-flow Map

The multi-flow map is used to show cause and effect relationships

Jason used the multi flow map to help him to understand what causes global warming and its effects on the environment.







Double Bubble The double bubble map is used to compare and contrast. Vidhu participated in a class debate about

whether we should cull badgers or vaccinate them in the hope of controlling the spread of bovine tuberculosis.

Five whys

Reema wanted find out why burning fossil fuels isn't good for the environment, she used a technique called Five Whys, which was developed in Japan to quickly find out more about the root of a problem.








We wish you all a great summer holiday and hope you have lots of fun planned. We will see you all in September ready for the next school year.

BSL Centre Summer Term 2016

The summer half term is one of the busiest times for us in the BSL Centre. We have exams weekly and learners begin to realise the end of their course is nearing. Some are looking forward to returning in September to continue developing their BSL skills, others are thinking about how to utilise their skills. Which ever direction our learners choose we have enjoyed

Our parents group has grown this year welcoming new faces and supporting the regular family members. Some have been taking their BSL level 1 assessments, they will continue to finish the course in the new academic year. Those who are regular had enjoyed developing their linguistics of BSL





This year we

have delivered 6 BSL level 1 courses. Two of these have been at two schools, St Luke's and Batchwood. The pupils have enjoyed learning BSL level 1 for young people. The other four courses have gone well at the centre, three adult courses and one young persons.

BSL level 2 has been delivered over three courses this year, learners have been sitting exams over the last few weeks. Our Thursday evening class was very popular this year. Some learners will be returning in September to study BSL Level 3.





BSL Level 3 was delivered over two courses, learners have their final assessments over the next week. Learners have enjoyed learning about Deaf

culture and the History of BSL.



We have been really busy with BSL level 4, delivering 3 courses this year. Learners have broadened their linguistic knowledge and learnt how to self analyse and improve their productive skills. Self analysis requires learners to film conversation clips and then look at their skills, picking out linguistic elements that require improvement.





Level 4 has been an enjoyable course to teach with the learners I have had this year.

One student said, *"Enrolling on the BSL level 4 course has meant that I have developed my skills and gained confidence with my signing. I have been able to meet new people and have some me time, which as a new mum has been precious."*


The Thursday Level 4 students have really worked together and developed friendships. This has been key to supporting each other through the course. A first for us at the BSL Centre was a lesson delivered to a learner in Barcelona. One of our Level 4 students was away at a conference and didn't want to miss her evening class. Skype was set up and the lesson continued as normal. It worked really well and was just as fun as being with the rest of the class in the room!



Students are able to develop their BSL skills in a variety of ways, including receptive practice, translating information from BSL to English or English to BSL and conversational work.
