In addition to the day to day classroom learning the activities shown in the newsletter are an important part of children and young people's school experience. The staff also keep a very close eye on how children are progressing with learning. We use the information published by the government (Performance Tables) to compare how we are doing with other special schools and schools for deaf children. We are excited to report that the latest results show Heathlands to be in the top 5 schools nationally of 408 special schools for the progress children make by year 11. This is a fantastic achievement and both staff and pupils should be proud of their efforts. Along with another Outstanding Ofsted inspection of Heath House the end of term felt very positive indeed.

This year we say goodbye to several staff members. Mrs Jordan-Caws, Mr Farooq and Miss Gomez are all leaving to start their teacher training so we wish them well.

I hope all parents, staff and pupils enjoy their summer break. Whilst you are away work will continue in school as we undertake further refurbishment of lower school classrooms and toilets so that everything will be ready for your return in September.

They looked at plants that they could touch, taste and smell during a visit to Bunnings hardware and garden store and were able to practise their communication and money skills. Back at school they worked together to create the garden, developing team work skills and planting and growing knowledge.







### Careers workshops at Whipsnade Zoo

Year 10 and 11 students took part in some useful careers workshops at Whipsnade zoo to gain an understanding of the career options available to them in conservation science. Students learnt about the work of zoos in conserving endangered species through different programmes. They also learnt about the role of a zoo keeper and the skills and personal

qualities needed for this job.





Some students took

part in a real animal behaviour study, where they collected and analysed data on chimpanzees. This was a really useful activity in helping students to use their communication and numeracy skills. The workshops have helped our students to explore their preferences and interests, which should in turn help them on their career journey.

During the summer holidays, if there are any Open Careers Events in your area, try to encourage your child to attend as these are a great place to go and meet different employers and training providers; they can give your child an insight into different careers, employers, apprenticeships and qualifications and help prepare them for the future.

# SCHOOL GARDENING


This year some students have been really involved in gardening; it is recognised that giving student ownership to something often helps to develop self-esteem.

Some students have attended the weekly gardening club to look after our school environment. They enjoyed working as a group to look after plants and vegetables and were nvolved in a fundraising initiative for the cultural trip to Madrid. The impact on students' confidence, team working and communication skills has been significant. US3 students also submitted evidence of their gardening skills for an AQA Unit Award and they made their own gardening book to help them to remember the skills involved.

The Royal Horticultural Society presented the school with three certificates – Gardening Level 1, 2 and 3 in recognition of the fantastic evidence submitted. The plan for next year is to continue developing students' gardening skills and interest and work towards achieving the RHS Level 4 award.

US1 have been learning about Women's Suffrage - women's right to vote. The students made protest signs and performed a mini protest march. Here are some of the signs made by the students in class.







'Staying Alive' recently delivered a half day basic first aid training session for year 10 and 11 students as part of the







# **BSL** Centre

# Summer Term 2017

The summer term is one of the busiest times for us in the BSL Centre, with exams daily. Learners begin to realise the end of their course is nearing and they start to think about the next step. Some are looking forward to returning in September to continue developing their BSL skills, others are thinking about how to utilise their skills. Whichever direction our learners choose we have enjoyed teaching them and wish them well for their future.



Our parents group has welcomed new faces and supported the regular family members this year. Some have been taking their BSL level 1 assessments, they will continue in the new academic year. Those who are regular have enjoyed developing their knowledge of BSL linguistics and story telling skills.



This year we has seen the delivery of five BSL level 1 courses. Two of these have been at two local schools, St Luke's and Batchwood, where the pupils have enjoyed learning BSL level 1 for young people.



The other three courses have gone well at the centre; two adult courses and one young persons'. They all await assessment results to see how they have done.

Our fast track course was delivered by Louise, a new BSL tutor who joined our team in January. Louise has enjoyed the group and hopes to be back next year with us.

BSL level 2 has again been delivered over three courses this year. Learners have been sitting exams over the last few weeks and so far results have been great! Our Thursday evening and Friday day classes were very popular this year. The majority of learners will be returning in September to study BSL Level 3.



BSL Level 3 was delivered over two courses, learners have all taken their final assessments and await results. Level 3 feels like a huge jump from level 2 for learners but as teachers we can really see skills mature and become embedded. The development is lovely to see. September 2017 will see the delivery of three level 3 courses here at the BSL Centre.

Zayne taught his first Level 3 class this year and is looking forward to teaching it again in September. He taught a great group on Friday's and they have all done really well.









BSL level 4 this year consisted of one course with 6 learners. Learners have developed their linguistic knowledge and learnt how to self-analyse, marking their own film clips. They have completed their portfolios and are awaiting their exam results.

All our courses are interactive, learning through activities, debates, discussions, research, from each other and from the teachers. Level 1 is mostly teacher led, level 2 has this element but also introduces debates and discussions with some research. On levels 3 and 4 the learner is expected be actively involved within the deaf community to enable development and use of BSL in real scenarios. The most important part in a learner's journey is to use skills by meeting other BSL users in the Deaf community.
