They looked carefully at the source materials and worked together well, solving problems effectively.



# **Upper School - Summer Term 2018**

We wanted our students to experience the excitement and value of chemistry, and to understand that the chemical sciences are relevant to their everyday lives. We received funds from the Royal Society of Chemistry to enable us to work with Dr Audrey

Cameron, who is a member of the Royal Society of Chemistry. The 'Great Deaf Chemical Kitchen Ambassadors' project took place over four school days and involved the Upper School students learning about the principles of kitchen chemical sciences. There were lots of WOW

experiments that had a strong link to chemical sciences and this project helped our students to develop their presentation, engagement and team working skills. Our students were empowered to believe that they could be 'Deaf Kitch-Chemical Ambassadors' and presented different experiments through filming.





In May, Upper School students took part in a STEM Day, investigating the air quality of St Albans. In different groups, they used their STEM skills to collect and analyse data, present their results and make suggestions on how the air quality in St Albans could be improved.

We are only at the start of our journey and have just achieved our Bronze Award this term. We can now start working on our Silver Award.



This term has seen our work related events and visits continue to ensure that our students get a real taste of life after Heathlands. We welcomed staff from Uxbridge College who spoke to the Year 10s about applying for college and choosing the right courses. US6 prepared and delivered a BSL taster lesson to the Rotary Club who would be accompanying the lower school annual trip to Whipsnade Zoo. Some of the members stayed on to talk to Upper School classes about the benefits of volunteering.





US7 students spent 3 days work experience at Harpenden police station shadowing a police officer and doing a range of different activities to increase their understanding of the work at a police station. Richard Weinbaum, an ex-student and current gover-

nor of the school gave a talk to students about his career and the benefits of choosing an apprenticeship compared to going to university.




## Heath House—Summer Term 2018

Heath House cooking: Heath House children have been getting involved in cooking this term. They have been taking it in turns to cook the evening meal for each other. This has been a fun, popular and enjoyable activity. The children have developed their knowledge and cookery skills throughout the term. This has also been useful to encourage some children to be more adventurous with food choices.

Gardening project: The Heath House gardening project continues to thrive. The children went to the local garden centre and chose a variety of vegetables. These have now been planted and we are looking forward to seeing how they will grow. The children have learnt to take care of vegetables remembering to water them.

Money management: Children have been working on developing their money management skills this term and have had regular trips to the shops to buy cookery ingredients, groceries and treats. This has helped to develop their knowledge of road safety and free walking.

Big space: Some of the younger children chose to go to big space this term where they had a lovely time and really enjoyed themselves.



Crazy golf: Some of the children chose to play crazy golf this term. They had a really positive time and thoroughly enjoyed themselves. After this activity we all went out for a meal. The children look forward to going again and having the opportunity to beat their scores.

**Vets:** This term some of the children helped to take the Heath House rabbits Casper and Snowball to the vets to have their yearly check up and injections. This proved to be a good learning opportunity as the children learnt about the importance of keeping up to date with vaccinations.

Cinema: The older children enjoyed going to the cinema to see "Jurassic World Fallen Kingdom". They had a great time and enjoyed the film and of course popcorn.

Every day hazards: This term staff have been working with the children to teach them how to manage everyday accidents and hazards. The children enjoy the opportunity to play the injured victim. At first this highlighted some areas we need to work on to support children as they were unsure how to act when staff were not with them. Since starting this activity we have seen considerable improvement in how children deal with solving problems.

Gym equipment: In the evenings Heath House children have been taking full advantage of the new school outdoor gym. They use the equipment most evenings and have enjoyed being able to work on their fitness ready for sports day.



E-safety: Children have learnt about e-safety but need help from parents to make sure they are using the internet safely during the school holidays.



Art and crafts: This year the Heath House children have got fully involved in the World Cup. They organised a World Cup competition. They made flags and shirts ready for the family BBQ. They also helped to make a variety of food such as kebabs, burger cup cakes and fruit jellies. In the evenings they have also been following their teams on TV.

## **BSL Centre - Summer Term 2018**

As this academic year draws to close, we a looking towards developing our courses for September 2019.

2017-2018 has been a roller-coaster of a year in the BSL Centre, we have had 140+ learners on various courses developing their skills. This is the highest number of learners so far and next year looks to be just as busy.

There have been several new arrivals, two boys and girl, congratulations to the parents!

We have also had to say goodbye to a member of our team, Androulla Ash. Androulla has been a member of the BSL team for 6 years and worked in the school before that. We wish her well for the future, she will be missed by us all.



Three of our BSL Level 1 courses have all completed exams and are awaiting results.

Our Two fast track courses have one more exam to do next week.

The Level 1 course at ST Albans Girls' School also finished this week with their final exam.

BSL Level 2 classes have final exams this week, all learners have been working hard practising their receptive skills.

The BSL level 2 Young people's group has done really well and are excited to continue their learning in September. Some students finished exams last week and are nervously waiting for results to come through.



BSL Level 3 day course this year has been slightly different due to the size of the class. Zayne and Emma decided to team teach this class and it has been a good experience for both of them. Although it was busy with so many learners, the group worked well and the enthusiasm from learners enabled us to deliver a course we are both proud of.

Thursday evening Level 3 course was very different, fewer learners but with personal connections to the deaf community. Both courses have finished assessments and are awaiting re-

sults.









Both our BSL pre-level 3 and pre-level 4 courses were popular this year, they have been developing their receptive and productive skills ready for the next level of learning.

BSL Level 4 consisted of two courses, Monday evening and Friday day. Both courses have their final exams this week. All learners have worked hard to create portfolios and develop their skills to match the Level 4 standard.

Our first BSL Level 6 cohort is half way through the course already. Candidates are busy filming clips for their portfolios and self analysing them before submission.

This course will complete on 15th December.




