Tom. 'Bad to the Bone' was one song played! The students are really enjoying the lessons and Tom is very impressed by their progress.




Otters Class are studying Sikhism in Religious Education

We are very excited to use our new smart board in the sound and light room as part of the pupil's speech and language therapy. Some students practised their vocabulary knowledge, following the word aware approach with a 'word wizard' map. We thought about the



sound parts and meaning parts of a word i.e. visual phonics for 'a' for 'apple'. Other students enjoyed practising their listening, lip reading and vocabulary by following spoken instructions to draw pictures on the board. They also practised their English clarification skills, for example 'can you say it louder', 'can you say it slower' and 'hand down please I need to lip read'.







In February Otters class went to Bhaktivedanta Manor near Watford. This is an interesting place showing how the Hare Krishna faith is

practised daily. The children learnt about the Hindu religion and how

they worship many Gods. They were fascinated to see the colourful Gods and dressed up as a God with a beautifully painted face. They also went on a cart ride pulled by two enormous cows and fed them carrots while learning why cows were so sacred. After a delicious vegetarian lunch, they then had a walk around the tranguil woods and saw the beautifully carved trees in the peaceful grounds.

watched carefully for the next instruction from their partner and learnt how to cut, measure and thread the owl to make it flap its wings and fly.

students. News and craft clubs have already started and an after school Youth Club both 'home and away' is beginning soon!

Every two years we take part in the 'Living Eggs' experience, which in-

volves taking delivery of 10 fertilised chicken eggs in an incubator. Over the next couple of days both the staff and pupils, watch in awe as they courageously break out of their shell, it looked very exhausting! The experience for the pupils has deepened their knowledge of life cy-

cles, developed their language, and given them first hand experience of caring for live animals.

It was fantastic to see so many Lower School pupils (and a few staff) dressed up for our character themed book week parade.



MS2 have been learning how to support poorer countries as part of their Geography studies. They have been researching overseas charities and learning about the Fairtrade Organisation. A group of students from Bishop Hatfield Girls' School came and did a workshop with the group and had them painting t-shirts to help people to recognise the organisation's symbol and to encourage people to buy Fairtrade products.



Upper School - Spring Term 2019



GCSE students had a good start to 2019 investigating extension and what happens when applying forces to a spring.



In Geography, year 8 students investigated temperature around the school. They used a thermometer to accurately record the temperature in different rooms, corridors and outside.



Year 10 student leaders organised another Eco Quiz. Middle School students were paired up with students from US5. Well done to everyone who organised and took part in the quiz. It's always good to keep thinking about what we can do to help the environment.

Congratulations to the Upper School team from Heathlands who achieved second place, silver, in the National Swimming Championships held in January at the Olympic swimming pool. Congratulations to Knightsfield, another Hertfordshire school, for coming first. There were only 3 points in it. One of the pupils taking part said: "When I started today I was nervous, but I feel good when I'm in the

water. I get a real sense of achievement when I get out and see my team-mates clapping. It's

amazing to be here in this giant arena."



4-10th February was Children's Mental Heath Week. The senior students gave a presentation to encourage children and young people to look after

their bodies and minds. They explained, very clearly, that our bodies and minds are connected

and how important it is for us to do different things to improve our physical well being, which will help our mental wellbeing too.



US5 students have been learning how to build series and parallel electric circuits.



In February a number of Upper School Students attended the Deaf Football Tournament in Derby. The Junior Boys got to the semi final and lost 2-1 to Hanson School, who were the eventual winners of the tournament. One of our girls team's got to the final, losing 1-0 to the winners of the tournament

US1 used drama to explore a key chapter from the book 'The Beast'. They learned about the importance of stage directions in a script and followed them to make their role-play more realistic. They also practised making the sounds described in the stage directions: scratching, howling and barking.

GCSE students did practical investigations on the topic of specific heat capacity and temperature. They also made copper sulphate crystals by reacting copper oxide with sulphuric acid.







Three girls from Marlborough School visited Miss Monk's reading group. The visitors interviewed our students about their experiences using subti-

tles on YouTube as a part of their research for their school magazine. They had a very interesting discussion about how appalling subtitles can be on YouTube!



US3 finished their home learning task to create a project on a specific planet. They all brought in their work from home and there were lots of informative facts and creativity. Well done US3; all of them received certificates in Assembly.











As a part of World Book Day, some students from Miss Monk's reading group went to St Albans Girls' Schoool to meet the

bestselling author Karen McCombie. They watched her fantastic presentation and had their books signed!



US9 students have been busy making rice dishes for their food technology courses. The smells coming from the kitchen



today were mouth-watering! We hope the students enjoyed eating their efforts!



This term, RAD came to Heathlands to run some Money Mechanics and For the Year 9, 10 and 11 students. The Year 9s



learnt about the value of money and money management - the ins and outs of earning, saving and budgeting. Whilst the Year 10s and 11s were given the challenge of setting up their own small businesses selling chocolate, tea and plants. They all relished the challenged and did well, with a total of £238 going to their chosen charities. Needless to say, we enjoyed the treats!



BRITISH British Science week 11th to 15th March 2019 At the begin-SCIENCE ning of the week we spent time with classes doing kitchen chemistry experiments led by the students who were involved in last year's project. They were brilliant and remembered a lot of pro-



cedures. Dr Cameron from Edinburgh joined us on Tuesday where the Lower School classes visited the lab to do a lot of WOW experiments. Some of the ex-

periments included making slime, carbon dioxide balloons with vinegar and bicarbonate of soda, worms with Gaviscon, watching sugar cubes absorbing food colouring and we watched our raisins dance in soda water due to the gas bubbles in it. We enjoyed some parents and their friends coming to the nursery where we did a lot of sensory chemistry experiments. Some students were involved in investigation whether micro-fibres of plastic get into the water when synthetic clothes are washed. They were shocked at the results and decided to write a letter to the Prime Minister to look at introducing a new law to reduce the use of plastic materials. Our highlight of the week was having Frank Barnes and Oak Lodge school students joining us. This was a valuable opportunity to develop social skills whilst learning about science together. The British Science Association has provided funds of support to enable us to take part in the British Science Week – thank you very much!

At the end of March a number of the students took it in turns to help on a St Albans market stall





BSL Centre - Spring Term 2019

Easter is rapidly approaching and our courses are heading towards exam time. This term has been as busy as ever; two new Level 1 fast track courses began in January. Learners have just completed their first exam and are now developing their vocabulary and topic knowledge ready for the second assessment. The parents' group would like more parents to attend: Mondays 9.30am-11.30am. We've a seen some new faces, but it would be lovely to see more. The sessions are free for parents, carers or other adult family members of Heathlands School students.



Our two intensive courses— Linguistics and Receptive have just finished this week.
Our next Receptive intensive

BSL Level 3 learners are working toward their linguistics assessments and have also been developing their receptive and productive skills. Part of the level 3 course is to learn to develop your self evaluation skills, learners have been doing this by filming themselves and watching the clip picking out linguistic elements they have used. This leads into BSL Level 4 where learner have to self analyse 4 of their filmed clips as evidence.

Our two BSL Level 1 courses that began in September are sitting their second assessment the beginning of April.

The BSL Level 2 courses are working towards their first assessment and practising their conversational skills.



BSL Level 4 classes have been working hard filming clips and self analysing for their portfolios. They have also been learning how to translate from BSL to English and English to BSL.

Enrolment for September courses are open and interviews will be held in June 2019.
