Lower and Middle School - Summer Term 2019



In History, MS2 found out about German priest Martin Luther's wish to reform the church. MS2 students looked at the differences between Roman Catholic churches and Protestant churches from the early

1500s and noted that the Roman Catholic churches had very ornate features, such as stained glass windows, and the Protestant churches were less grand. The students made stained glass windows as part of the discussion over whether the windows were an important tool to teach people about God or whether they were a waste of people's money that could be better spent on the people.

Deer class tried solving area problems in maths. They created problems on a set or rectangles which had missing lengths or widths. It was quite challenging!



Squirrels class have been learning about food chains, and showed their learning through making a fun food chain picture.

Otters class created interesting pieces of art to show the galaxy. First of all they marked out the

stars and comets on the paper using wax crayons. This created barriers for the painting. They then splashed paints and water onto their drawings and moved the paints around by blowing through the straws to create their galaxy pictures.

MS3 students learnt how genes determine your appearance.

They were given two sets of chromosomes and


had to randomly mix them in different ways to a genotype (dominant or recessive). From this information they followed instructions to make a sketch of a human face.






class planted peas and carrots.

In April, James Merry a deaf animator came to Heathlands to do workshops with two groups:- Middle




School 1 and 2 and the GCSE Year 10 group. The Middle School classes enjoyed learning about his

each person had a home or was homeless.

US4 have been studying poetry in their English lessons. This unit of work culminated with students devising and performing their own BSL poems. They experimented with how to incorporate poetic devices such as repetition (of particular signs, handshapes or placement), rhythm and characterisation.

US9 organised a competition to design some artwork for the Bus Stop. Almost every child in the school got involved and the runners up can be seen in the display in school. The chosen designs were judged by Mr Jordan-Caws (Chair of the PTA), the students of US9 and Mrs Brinsden. They have been framed and will be on display inside the Bus Stop.



A 'reduce electricity day' was organised by the students in our Ecogroup. This was part of the Sustainable St Albans Festival. It really helped to make people think about

whether they needed the lights on or not for different activities. Some students spent the lunchtime making wind mills.

Young Deaf Hope delivered a workshop "What are healthy relationships" at Heathlands Youth Club. Young people were involved to discuss their thoughts on "what are bad and good relationships" and "What does relationship mean?"

















Students in US3 have been learning about writing and following instructions. For a recent project, they all worked hard to design their own board games. They then wrote instructions to accompany them, and played each other's games to test out how clear and successful their rules were.

At the end of May, our student leaders gave a short talk on revision strategies and tips to a group of Year 9 and 10 students.





The school council ran a workshop designing tiles to represent the school. Their works of art will be on display around the school soon!



On June 14th, we said goodbye to year 11 in our leavers assembly. Congratulations to all of them for completing their exams. Particular congratulations to the students who won the

Heathlands Award and the Michael Wilson Trophy. We had the traditional Year 11 leavers staff vs pupils match. This year they played Dodgeball. The

US3 and US4 students visited Red Bee Media in West London. We met the regular BBC lunch time news interpreter and visited the studio. They asked a lot of interesting questions

about how to become an interpreter (hearing and deaf can become interpreters) and tried to do a bit of "interpreting" - initially students thought it was easy but when they tried to do it themselves they found it hard.

Student Leaders delivered a logo quiz. All the students enjoyed it. Both teams got the same amount of correct



answers so it was a draw. Next time the organisers promised it would be much harder!






Heath House - Summer Term 2019

This term: This has been a very busy term for the young people. They have been involved in a wide range of activities inside and outside of Heath House. They have been learning new skills and developing their independence ready for their future.

Evening cooking: The young people are regularly involved in cooking the evening meals in Heath House. They all take it in turns and have been learning new recipes and skills



BSL Centre- Summer Term 2019

Wow another academic year comes to an end! This term saw the BSL Centre celebrating its 10th Anniversary. Over the 10 years of delivering BSL Courses the Centre has grown from strength to strength. Staff feel very lucky to be part of the Centre's development and see the growth in the number of courses and range of levels on offer to learners. Back in 2009 the first BSL level 1 course had 18 learners attending lessons on a Monday evening. This academic year 2018-2019 has seen a record number of 148 learners on courses from Levels 1 to 6.

The future of the BSL Centre is just as exciting as the last 10 years and we hope to expand and see the delivery of BSL Interpreting and Translation courses.

Over the years we have seen some staff come and go. This term our wonderful administrative assistant Alison is leaving our team, we wish her well. We will

have a new member of staff, Lise, joining the team to take on administrative duties in September.

Good luck to all learners who are finishing courses and awaiting results, we wish the learners leaving us all the best for the future and we look forward to seeing the lucky ones returning in September to continue developing their BSL skills.




