Lower School - Autumn Term 2019



Butterflies class have been learning about measuring using different equipment; counters, cubes and paper clips. They made estimates first and learnt how to provide more accurate judgements of how many

they thought would fit the pencil, cup and water bottle lengths. They also made symmetrical butterflies using rulers to measure how far away the dots needed to be to be really symmetrical.



Bees Class have been exploring the new sensory Reading Garden in their classroom. They have enjoyed choosing their own books of interest and sharing stories.

We have started a new weekly award in Lower school called the Heathlands Family award. In families everyone looks after everyone else and at Heathlands everyone is encouraged to be kind to each other. On Friday's in assembly the award will be given to pupils whose teachers have noticed them being kind and helpful to others. Fireflies class have created a display to help everyone understand what that means.

tall and something that smells. They were very observant and particularly enjoyed smelling the mint plant.




In PSHCE, Butterflies class have been learning about Healthy Eating. Their task in Food Technology was to design, make and evaluate a healthy 'breakfast pot!'

Finally, they have become beautiful butterflies.







US5 students have been learning how to test different food groups.



There was an Arts focus afternoon where KS3 demonstrated the used of the new apple pens funded through the St. Albans Arts Society. They use them on ipads to create stories in apple 'keynote' apps. They drew characters and designed backgrounds and some students used them to animate shapes and pre-set objects. They then further demonstrated their skills by teaching lower school students.



This also included film work and editing using the film quality camera again purchased with Arts society funding. Heathlands are very proud of our student who was selected as a finalist at the St Albans Arts Award!

The Year 11 Drama group went for a morning Theatre workshop at St Albans High School for Girls. They enjoyed devising a piece of Theatre based on Greta Thunberg's recent speech to the UN. They worked well

with the girls and came up with good ideas to create a unique piece of Drama. Well done to all involved.



Year 11 GCSE Media students also used these pens to create storyboards for pre-production coursework documents.

We have recently had 20 achieve the Bronze Arts Award. Students will continue to develop creativity through an Arts Award 'Poetry e-motion' project combining media art, computing and English in producing and publishing an e-book.

Heathlands held an Arts Award event to mark Artsmark's national celebration for arts and cultural education. Artsmark is the Arts Council England's award for schools and educational settings that champion the arts and strive for excellence. Heathlands has started their journey towards Gold status. The film KS3 students made was screened and special guests and staff enjoyed

watching a skills-share, where the Arts Award students taught the younger students the skills they had developed, in small groups. This included storytelling using ipads and apple pencils, camera work, directing, acting, photography and film editing using apple macs. We were delighted to welcome the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Hertfordshire, Akhtar Zaman, who, spoke of the importance of the Arts in education and whose background is also in technology and film. Our masterclass professional, Ashley Kendall,



spoke of the importance of developing creativity and gave achievement badges to the students.

In science, US1 have been learning about sound. As part of this they made their own musical instruments and put together a band.



Year 11 have been busy collecting Ergonomic research to help them design a range of assembly on the topic of well playground toys for their D&T GCSE coursework task. Students from Ladybirds and Fireflies class were very helpful and keen to help out. A big thank you to all.


very informative as they are now looking into college placements and courses they would like to do after

The new academic year has started well, we have 91 learners on different courses. It's lovely to see learners returning to tackle to the next level in their BSL journey and new learners starting.



BSL Level 6 began in September with the new qualification, learners are getting to grips with making sure they can use their linguistic theory in practice. To achieve the new level 6 assessments and portfolios.

Both our BSL level 2 courses are full and learners have been developing both their productive and receptive skills.
