For now, stay safe, stay home and stay healthy.




#### **Lower School - Autumn Term 2019**




Bees class are taking part in a programme called Fish Keeper Fry. They have learnt how to set up a tank and look after fish. Now the fish have started to arrive.


anemometer, a thermometer and rain gauge. They worked either

Finally, they had to use a strip heating machine to bend their plastic into a shape.



US6 have designed and made their own cam mechanism toy to demonstrate rotary and oscillating motion.

A student from the sports leaders group led a dodgeball activity in her PE lesson today. The student clearly laid out the area with the correct equipment and explained the rules of the activity to


the students and answered any questions. Good leadership skills were demonstrated, well done.



#### Careers and Enterprise

We have been working hard to secure work experience placements for our very large Year 11 group this year (13 students) trying to match up their requests to local employers. We have also been busy organising events for our Careers Week at the end of June (which may need to be postponed).

We were delighted with our results in the selfevaluation exercise we carry out every term. We are making good progress on the Gatsby Benchmarks which allows us to measure our progress against other schools in the whole country.

We want our students to have a great experience when they are on placement and if we can place them with a member of deaf staff or someone who can sign, this really helps give them a worthwhile learning experience. US3 have been learning mapping skills as part of their Geography studies. They had to follow directions into town and then had to match important St Albans landmarks to their correct position on their maps

GCSE students have been investigating the relationship between voltage, current and resistance for a resistor and a filament lamp.

US7 have been using foam board in their Design Technology lessons to model their ideas for a storage unit.



Some of our students were selected to represent the school at the 2020, Rotary Schools Technology Tournament. Over 30 schools from around the borough competed to build a flashing beacon using materials supplied by the Rotary Club.

Teams were asked to connect a light to an electrical circuit and design their own device to make the light turn on and off. Points were awarded for each flash up to a maximum of 20 flashes.

All of our teams were successful in managing to complete the task within the time given but were narrowly beaten by another schools' team whose beacon flashed more often given them a higher score.







## **Heath House - Spring Term 2020**



#### **BSL Centre - Autumn Term 2019**

With this strange time we are living in we have had to adapt and create online classrooms. Whilst creating classrooms for all our courses we deliver, we are also creating a Parents Group. BSL Level 3 is where learners discover more about BSL linguistics and the essential part it plays in our language. It allows the learner to develop and understand their skills by using BSL in a safe and encouraging environment. They have been discussing consumer issues and daily living for Deaf people.

BSL Level 4 have been working on their portfolios, unfortunately these are on hold until we can get film clips done again. They will be focusing on receptive and productive skills, translating BSL clips into English and English
