
Y10 demonstrated their fantastic learning on the structure of DNA by making models using sweets.



As part of their learning on the respiratory system Zeta class made a model to demonstrate inhalation and exhalation in the lungs.






Delta class have been working hard on their revision mind maps. Some students chose to work together.

presentation, engagement and team working skills.






This term: This has been a positive term for the children and young people they have really enjoyed getting back together after a long summer. They have also made many new friends as we have had a number of new additions to our ever growing Heath House family. We have also been fortunate enough to welcome a new member of staff to the team in Grace who looks forward to the new challenges her role will present.

Pool party: After the summer we were fortunate enough to be able to have utilise the last of the sunshine by having a private pool party at a local school. One child said "I really enjoyed pool party, was good fun we played lots of games. Best part we had pool to ourselves".

Dunstable Downs:

The young people had a go at flying some stunt kites at Dunstable Downs. The young people enjoyed this activity although they found it difficult as we lost the wind. However they did enjoy the view from atop the hill.



Blackberry picking: Some of the young people went blackberry picking this term. They managed to gather quite a number of berries which they enjoyed finding a recipe and turning into a blackberry crumble. One child said "I enjoy pick fruit we got loads".

Another child said "We found recipe for Blackberry crumble. We follow recipe make crumble. Really delicious".





Quasar: This term the young people enjoyed going to Quasar. We visited a new centre where the young people had a really good time.

St Johns deaf club: A number of the young people have been attending this activity. They have learnt the journey to the deaf club. They have had to walk to the station, pay for a ticket and catch a train to get there. The young people have made some new friends.

Park: Some of the younger children have enjoyed going to a local park to play as well as going to the local shops for a treat.

Water colour painting:

This term the young people had a go at learning how to use water colours.

One child said "I enjoy learn new skills and try make nice picture".

Shopping: Some of the young people have been acquiring free walking permission to go out in the evenings. Others have gone with staff but all have been practicing their money management skills by going to the shops regularly to buy a treat or to buy ingredients for cooking.



Cooking: The young people have continued to get involved in cooking. They have been learning to make a wide variety of new recipes and learning how to cook without support or guidance from staff.

Hall games: Now that the weather is starting to change, the young people have been making more use of the school hall to play games and take part in activities. They have spent time playing bench ball, badminton, volley ball, table tennis and dodgeball.

BSL Level 1 and Level 1 young people

BSL Level 1 courses are doing well, all learners have sat their first exams and are developing their BSL vocabulary and understanding of Deaf Culture.

We have a BSL Level 1 young peoples course again this year and they are all enjoying learning through different activities, as well as taught sessions.

Exams have gone well so far for level 1 learners!

BSL Level 2s

We have another two lovely classes of Level 2 learners this year. All are doing well developing their vocabulary and learning sentence structure.

They are discovering more about regional variations and receptive clips in preparation for their receptive exams next year.

BSL Level 3



We have two level 3 classes this year, they have been learning linguistics and developing their skills with the additional knowledge.

This is what we call the realisation level, where learners realise there is more to BSL than just the language and leaning vocabulary.

The history, culture and social side to BSL is much greater than learners realise until Level 3, this is where they learn

BSL Level 4 and Level 6

"I learn something new every week in class" Level 4 learner I love teaching BSL Level 4 and Level 6, this is where the learners have communication skills they couldn't see themselves using when they first started BSL Level 1.

Level 4 enables the learner to continue developing their linguistic knowledge and put this into practice with productive skills.

Both levels develop vocabulary knowledge within different areas; medical, law, political, social and more.

Level 6 learners tend to reflect more on their journey so far and then set their sights on where they want to go with their BSL skills. They may decide to become Communicators or continue into Interpreting.

Seeing a learner through each level of BSL is magical, their understanding of how to use BSL and their ability to sign is very noticeable at each level they achieve. It's one of the best things in teaching.
