

A message from the Co-Headteachers

Dear parents, carers, students and staff,

What a busy and eventful autumn term we have had at Heathlands! We have been grateful that the school has returned to normality with no covid tests and children finally enjoying going out of school regularly on trips and learning experiences. Although there has been a high amount of illness this term, the school has now been thrown in to the Christmas spirit with snow, ice, show performances and as we write this, secondary are enjoying the music and games of the Winter disco!

This term we have been focused on developing two main projects; the first is our building extension. It has taken a while, but the plans have come together, it was important to ensure we are getting the maximum benefit from our new building. The new space will give us six new teaching spaces benefitting both Upper and Lower school and has been designed by our deaf architect Richard Dougherty. The building is designed with deaf learners in mind, with natural lighting, wider walkways and sound proofing. We are hoping that planning permission will be granted in the next term so that building work can begin in Easter with the aim that our new classrooms will be ready for use before December 2023. Plans are in place to minimise the disruption on site during the building work so that learning will continue as normal. You can see the most up to date plans on display in the school office reception.

The second project we have been working on is extending the age range from 16 up to 18. A consultation is currently underway with a proposal showing how Heathlands can and will meet the needs of students wishing to study A Levels in KS5. The provision for deaf learners who use a Total Communication approach at this key stage is very limited nationally. Many of our leavers often go to colleges on lower level courses, supported by communication support workers and often isolated amongst peers. Our students deserve to have the same level of access as their hearing peers and Heathlands can meet this need by delivering a range of A Levels taught directly by teachers of the Deaf. Heathlands will join the local schools consortium allowing for some students to attend an A level within one of the local schools if it cannot be delivered at Heathlands and welcoming hearing students to learn BSL at our provision. Please go to our website to take part in the consultation so we have the maximum support in gaining this resource for our deaf learners. The second part of extending our age range will be to lowering the age range to 2 years old, allowing for toddlers to have access to Heathlands earlier in order to gain essential language in the early years. We will keep you updated with progress.

We wish you all a very happy winter break and look forward to welcoming all pupils back on 9th January. We are hoping that 2023 will continue to bring Heathlands lots of positive developments.


In Deaf Studies, Bananas class enjoyed learning about a range of equipment that could help Deaf people. They tried an alarm clock which would shake them to wake



Upper School met together to discuss their ideas for the student leader focus groups for this year.




Year 10. students have been preparing for GCSE mock examinations. There will be a series of mock examinations over future months leading up to the final examinations in June 2024.

It has been a very busy term in Heath House we have welcomed new members of staff and have welcomed new students throughout the term. There are now 23 students in Heath House, students are enjoying having lots of peers to talk to in the evening.

Over the summer we had had a lot of renovation work carried out. We had a wall knocked down and the main kitchen extended. We also converted part of the building to give us an extra bedroom as well as a secondary independent living area.

A number of young people have continued to attend regular clubs whilst other younger people have tried out new clubs and activities.

In July we had 5 students complete their snorkelling course they joined another older boy in learning to play under water hockey. We now have another student who has taken up snorkelling with the view to join the underwater hockey group. The young people have shown a real talent for this sport and regularly out perform their hearing peers. They have organised their own team discussed their preferred positions and regularly win matches scoring multiple goals. One young person said "I practiced ready for competition against other local teams. We win 6-1".

The younger secondary went to a local trampoline park. They enjoyed jumping around and trying out a number of the obstacles. One young person said "we enjoyed trying out the assault course and climbing walls".



The young people have continued to get involved learning to cook. They have been learning from staff and following recipes. One child said "we been learn make lots different homemade food like meatballs, chicken goujons lots other food".





Some of the young people have been getting involved in baking and making cakes. One young person said "I like make cakes chocolate are my favourite".

The BSL Centre welcomes back our learners who have previously studied with us before and also welcomes new learners. For this year we have courses for Level 1, 2 and 4.

BSL

Our fast-track Level 1 course which started in September is now complete with our learners eagerly awaiting their results. Many of them will be progressing to our fast-track Level 2 course which starts in January.

Our evening Level 1 learners have just taken their 101 assessment and will start the new year developing their productive skills and BSL vocabulary in preparation for the exams in the Spring.

Level 2 are learning about everyday life topics and currently focusing on Food and Drink, expanding the BSL terminology that they learnt on Level 1.

Level 4 learners continue to progress with Zayne. They have been polishing their linguistics knowledge, building their portfolios and practicing their presentation, conversation and receptive skills.

Welcome Gemma



Gemma started learning BSL after moving to Nottingham for University. Alongside her Teacher Training course she attended evening BSL classes for 3 years. She now works at Heathlands School as a Teacher of the Deaf and our Level 1 course on Monday evenings.

"When I was younger I saw a BSL interpreted pantomime and it sparked my interest! When I started learning, I fell in love with the language and it ended up leading me down a completely different career path, exposing me to a whole new community of lovely people. The teaching allows me to meet other people who are also interested in doing similar things through learning BSL"

Welcome Robyn

Robyn started learning BSL at the age of 16 after wanting to communicate with Deaf people she had met. She passed her Level 2 then studied Level 3 to Level 6 here at the BSL Centre. Robyn now teaches our Level 1 and Level 2 courses with ambitions to train as an interpreter.

"I enjoy teaching as I feel I am able to reach out to the learners and understand from their perspective, after all I have been there myself. It is a privileged to be part of the Deaf community and have made some life-long friends"



Family Support Group
