

It has been another busy term at Heathlands with so many exciting things that have happened. It was fantastic to welcome a large group of year 7 students in addition to our first sixth form students. Heathlands is very full with over 150 students and more on the way in January 2025!

In September we welcomed all our students back to a new school year and a newly designed spaces that were created over the summer holidays. The Lower School playground was re-designed and now features a road and games for the children to enjoy, scooters to ride, a new trampoline and a great climbing frame for imaginative play! On top of that, an outdoor learning space was created and the dining room was re decorated. None of this would be possible without the generous donations from Friends of Heathlands as well as St Albans Arts Society. Last month we installed some amazing wall art, carefully designed by key staff displaying not just the world map, but a history wall showcasing different time periods and including deaf history within it; a photo of our students campaigning for the BSKL Act in 2022 is now a part of our shared history! The science corridor also boats wall art with the periodic table (for revision purposes!) and a whole host of Deaf scientists that have made their mark on our world!

This term we have enjoyed a host of trips, a visit from BBC Newsround, cycling proficiency, Anglo Saxons day a Heath House Ofsted inspection and a very successful day at the Rotary tournament with two teams winning first and third place awards. We were successful in the Primary swimming gala too securing 1st and 3rd place and Heathlands also came 1st in the deaf schools Cross Country with individual students also coming 1st in both the boys and girls category!

This term we are celebrating our Progress 8 scores. Progress 8 is a way of measuring the progress that pupils make from the end of key stage 2 (the last year of primary school) to the end of key stage 4 (when they take GCSEs). The higher a pupil's 'Progress 8' score, the more progress they have made in comparison with pupils who started at a similar level. In the summer Heathlands had 18 students taking external GCSE exams and the results were phenomenal, which is testament to how hard students and staff worked. We are over the moon to announce that Heathlands was the **highest attaining school for Deaf children nationally**, with a progress score of 0.93. This means that our year 11 students on average achieved almost one GCSE grade better than deaf and hearing students across England with similar attainment at the end of key stage 2.

Heathlands was the only school for Deaf children to achieve a progress score within the category of "well above average" which concurs with the schools Ofsted Outstanding rating that "pupils achieve very well from different starting points". Heathlands is also the highest attaining special school in the UK (No 1 of 1718 schools) and is ranked Number 107 out of 6542 schools in the national schools progress table. We could not be prouder of the results students achieve at Heathlands and the hard work that staff do to attain this.

After an astounding term to start the school year, we wish you all a restful Christmas and a peaceful new year!

Magpie Class had a fantastic time decorating the school Christmas tree. They realised there was no star for the top of the tree and decided to



In maths, **Barn Owl class** have been learning to sort objects into groups. Pupils enjoyed working together to sort objects by shape or colour before completing their independent learning.



The Anglo Saxons visitors were confused by Heathlands pupils all wearing blue, a colour that was very expensive for them to make so they associated it with rich people. Our visitors taught the children a little bit about life as an Anglo Saxon. There were lots of activities happening including making a 3D Viking longship, writing in Anglo Saxon runes, learning about Viking gods and goddesses, designing their own shields and examining Viking poo to find out what they ate.



One of our CoHead teachers presented to the **BSL Advisory Board** on the gaps in provision for Early Years education of deaf children, the evidence, impact



and possible solutions. This was alongside other Heads of specialist deaf schools who shared with same issues. There was a discussion with Stephen Timms, the Minister for Social Security and Disability about the changes that need to be made to ensure ALL deaf children get the language access and education they need from the outset.

Deaf Cross Country Championships







Physical Activities:

This term, we have a variety of physical activities to enjoy and participate in, promoting our physical fitness and using our energy. These include:

Table tennis, badminton, four-corner hockey, CrossFit bodyweight workouts and crossbar challenges.

These activities, along with many others, encourage our students to stay active, develop teamwork skills, and enjoy the benefits of outdoor exercise.







During the first half of the term, we introduced a new house point system to encourage the pupils to complete tasks such as cleaning the kitchen, tidying their bedrooms independently, and checking in without prompts. They collect points every week until the end of the term. They receive rewards for going out for a meal. Recently, the pupils went to the Waffle House and enjoyed their rewards with waffles of their choice.













Every Tuesday, we go to town to buy our weekly snacks. We usually take a walk to St. Albans and visit a variety of shops. We learn how to walk safely across the roads. The pupils learn to buy or calculate the amount to spend on their snacks. Also, many bought food ingredients to prepare for food technology atschool.

BSL


We have had a wonderful start to the year, welcoming back existing learners and saying hello to new ones. We were able to offer BSL Levels 1 to 4 and all are progressing well.


Already, our Level 1 fast-track course has been completed and those learners will start Level 2 fast-track in January 2025.

At the BSL Centre our team consists of deaf and hearing staff, who bring a variety of knowledge and experience to support our learners with their BSL journey.

We have our Family Sign group which is available on Mondays 2-3pm, term time only. These are free online sessions aimed at supporting communication within the family. So far various topics have been covered including Baby/Toddler routines and Seasonal Signs.
